Literacy rates post-pandemic are recovering slowly. Solutions grounded in the science of reading are the proven differentiators, which is why implementation is an increasingly urgent priority around the country. In a highly competitive environment, the continuous pressure for charter school organizations to prove their worth means vetting new programs for mission alignment, return on investment (ROI), and how well they support students' unique needs is non-negotiable.

The challenge is many decision-makers lack the time and resources needed to evaluate new solutions. However you fit into your charter's ecosystem, this checklist provides an easy-touse tool to help you champion evidence-based **literacy instruction in your school**. Use the following questions to help build your case—and make the evaluation process for leaders smooth and efficient.


